- 33% of all art teachers in L.A. County were let go betweeen 2008 and 2012.
- **50%** of all K-5 students in L.A. County had arts completely cut from their schooling betweeen 2008 and 2012.
- >95% of school-aged children are attending schools that have cut art program funding since
- >1.3 Million elementary students fail to get any music instruction today.
- ~4 Million elementary students fail to get any visual arts instruction today.

**3x** more students earn a BA in college who have arts-rich experiences in high school range of scholastic benefits of arts vs. those who don't.

13% of students show a n improvement in standardized writing scores as art education increased

**June and I** visited Palm Desert right before the pandemic lockdown took place in California. It was raining very hard and we forgot to bring our umbrellas, so we were ducking in and out of every storefront in the El Paseo Villiage trying to avoid getting soaked (we still were drenched, though).

We happened upon the Jones & Terwilliger Gallery and were introduced to the sculptor, Agnes Nyanhongo. We marvelled at her work and fell in love with many of the select pieces shown at the gallery. Although we couldn't afford to purchase one of her sculptures, she is now on our list of favorite artists and we look forward to hopefully one day being able to own one of her works.

A native of Nyanga, Agnes Nyanhongo is the daughter of first-generation sculptor Claud Nyanhongo and sister of Gedion Nyanhongo. She spent much time helping in her father's studio as a girl and began sculpting full-time in 1980, at 20 years old. In 1983, she entered the B.A.T. Workshop school at the National Gallery of Zimbabwe in Harare, where she spent three years

Stylistically, Nyanhongo's work is very similar to that of her father, and takes as its theme mainly female issues. Her sculptures are in the permanent collection of the Chapungu Sculpture Park in Harare, at the Museum of Outdoor Arts in Englewood, Colorado, and at the exhibition Zimbabwe Sculpture: a Tradition in Stone at Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International





The Nyanhongo ramily name resonates with a ring of enduring legacy. Born into an artistic family, agnes was heavily influenced by her father, "Claud Nyanhongo, a "First Generation" pioneer artist who helped ignite the "Shona Scupture" movement in the 1960's.

Carrying the family name across oceans through exhibitions in Europe, Asia, North America and beyond, the Nyanhongo family has carved their place as international artists of the highest regard.

Born of an artistic environment free from the constraints of formal artistic rules & boundaries, the **Zimbabwe Sculpture Movement** has become known as the most compelling & evocative form of art to emerge from Africa in the 20th century. First appearing in the late 1950s, the art soon

captured the attention of the west and has since been featured in many of the world's finest museums, galleries & private collections.

However, the significance of Zimbabwean stone sculpture lies not in the international recognition it has gained, but in its honest and emotional expression of the unique socio-cultural identity of the Zimbabwean community at large. The Zimbabwe Sculpture Movement reads as a testimony of time & place as the artists sculpt a cultural & spiritual induced depiction of the everchanging Zimbabwean society. As their community changes, new styles emerge to document both the past, the present, and a vision for what's to come.
